How important is attending school?

Attending school every day makes learning easier for your child and helps build and maintain friendships with other children. If students miss the basic skills in the early years of school, they may have problems later on. Regular attendance at school will help your child to succeed in later life. So far this term at EPS our average rate of attendance is 88%. The average attendance rate across the state is 94%. It would be wonderful to see us match this benchmark, if not exceed it. Let's try hard and do our very best to be at school every day and on time.

Parent Interviews

We invite all parents to attend a Parent Teacher interview to discuss their child's progress. This year we are holding our interviews in Week 10 - Term 2 on Wednesday 28th June. Please note we will be sending further information home later in the term outlining the booking process for interviews.

Student Reports

As part of our school Assessment and Reporting Process, parents receive two written reports each year. We will be sending home student's Semester one reports in Week 10 – Monday 26 June 2017. Some reminders when reading the report:

- Written reports are just one way that school uses to communicate with parents about how their child is progressing.
- Semester one reports only report on what has been taught and assessed in semester one.
- NESA (NSW Education Standards Authority), known in recent times as "The Board of Studies", determine and have developed the A to E grading scale descriptions of achievement. A comprehensive explanation of these descriptions is located on your child's report.
- Student reports will also include information on your child's level of effort, school activities, commitment to learning, absences and a final teacher comment.
- The grades that students receive are only one aspect of the report to parents and students.

Bullying v's Misunderstandings

Misunderstandings and arguments are pretty common in the playground. Kids are still developing social skills and learning how to communicate with others. Not every incident or disagreement that upsets a student can be defined as bullying. Sometimes it's a one-off problem or a genuine misunderstanding. Bullying is different. Bullying is a deliberate and repeated abuse of power of one student over another. It can be verbal, physical or psychological abuse that is intended to cause harm.

Emerton Public School has in place a comprehensive anti-bullying plan that can be found on our school website under 'Policies'. If you believe that your child is being bullied, please make contact with your child's classroom teacher to raise your concerns. Bullying is a serious issue, that can have life-long consequences for all kids involved, if it's left to go on unchecked. It is really important your child feels supported and that you encourage them to report any potential problems.


Learning for Life Scholarships


Stage 3 Western Sydney University Visit



Emerton School Camp

This year's annual camp is available for students from Years 3, 4, 5 and 6. These students are invited to attend a 2-day, overnight camp to 'Blue Mountains Camp' at Katoomba. The camp will take place from Thursday 16th November to Friday 17th November, 2017 which is Week 6 of Term 4.

The cost of the 2 day, overnight excursion is \$150.00. This price includes meals over the two days, bus travel to and from Katoomba and accommodation.

The camp has offered us a Team Building/Outdoor Living Program which covers Stage 2/3 Syllabus outcomes in PDHPE. Some example activities are team building challenges, outdoor living camping skills, orienteering team activities using compasses to navigate around a course and bushwalking to local lookouts and waterfalls.

There are only 50 places available to students who are interested in attending the excursion. A deposit of \$50 is required. The school camp can be paid off over the year. As little as \$5:00 per week will see your camp paid off in less than a term.
